



The George A. Andrews Distinguished Speaker Series





"Houston, we've had a problem." These words, uttered by Captain James Lovell during the dramatic Apollo 13 mission, are now part of the American lexicon.

Apollo 13 was to be NASA's third mission to land on the moon. The space vehicle launched on April 11, 1970, with Captain James Lovell (center), Fred Haise (left), and John Swigert aboard. The lunar landing was aborted when an oxygen tank exploded after about 56 hours of flight, crippling the service module. The three astronauts were faced with the possibility of becoming marooned in space. Oxygen was running short, carbon dioxide accumulations began to climb, and the cabin temperature dropped. If they were able to navigate the spacecraft back to Earth, they needed to enter its atmosphere at precisely the right angle.

Through teamwork and decisive leadership, the crew modified the lunar module, orbited the Moon without landing, and returned safely to Earth. Lovell later called the Apollo 13 mission "a successful failure," and mission flight control director, Gene Kranz described it as "NASA's finest hour."

President Richard Nixon awarded Lovell, Haise, and Kranz the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1970.


Message from XO - Fleet Captain Ryan Case

Personal Incredulity - is simply stating that the position counter to the one you hold is false because you believe it to be so or don't understand how it works. "I can't understand how you think microbes became Mozart." or "I don't see how any reasonable person would support teaching creation in schools." An individual's comprehension is not

relevant to the discussion. Airplanes fly whether or not one can describe the aerodynamics involved. - It's opinion pretending to be an argument. It's opinion pretending to be an argument.

Ambiguity (aka Semantics, Splitting Hairs or Equivocation) -

Using words and phrases aimed at creating an impression that a specific and/or meaningful statement has been made, when in fact only a vague or ambiguous claim has been communicated, enabling the specific meaning to be denied if the statement is challenged. 
No True Scotsman or "patriotic approach" - Wikipedia says the term was coined by Antony Flew, who gave an example of a Scotsman who sees a newspaper article about a series of sex crimes taking place in Brighton, and responds that "no Scotsman would do such a thing." When later confronted with evidence of another Scotsman committing worse crimes, his response is that "no true Scotsman would do such a thing," Modern variations in politics and media include politics, race, gender, religion, etc.

The fallacy boils down to:

"No Scotsman/Christian/American/Democrat would do/support X."

"This person (within that group) does/supports X." (statement proved false)

"No TRUE Scotsman/Christian/American/Democrat would do/support X"

New Horizons Mission to Reveal Pluto's Secrets: On December 6th, 2014, NASA's New Horizons probe came out of hibernation for its upcoming 2015 first ever contact with Dwarf Planet and Kuiper-Belt Object (KBO) Pluto. New Horizons was so far from Earth that at that time, the signal took more than four hours and 26 light minutes to reach us! Yes, it will take "WARP SPEED" to reach Pluto in under four hours. The probe is small but fast, only the size of a baby grand piano, but it travels at a fantastic 36, 373 mph, the fastest probe ever to leave our planet. Closest approach will be July 14th, 2015, and finally, we'll have a close up view of this mysterious frozen world. Following the encounter, it will make mid course corrections to rendezvous with at least one of three other KBO's recently found by the Hubble Space Telescope for just that purpose. The Kuiper Belt is a vast but sparsely populated "doughnut" shaped body of small frozen bodies left over from the original formation of the solar system.

Message from Chief Medical Officer - Lt. Emily Graves

I want to be a luddite for a moment.

I want to talk about notebooks.

When was the last time you physically wrote in a notebook?

Not a hastily scribbled-off note on a Post-It, or a correction on a recipe, smudged and almost erased by drips and smears over years of use.

When was the last time you sat down, with a pen and a full notebook of paper, and wrote?

A letter to a friend. A diary, covering the events of the day. A poem. A short story. A novel. Your thoughts on the modern world, or politics, or religion, or college football.

I spend most of my free time reading or writing. Free time is, of course, at something of a premium these days - but when I have it, writing is as pleasurable as anything else I do. It is quiet, it is cheap, it is meaningful. And it feels... it feels good. Not in the same way typing this feels - this is cold and calculated. It is as impacted by the margins (I can change them), the font (that, too), and the light of the screen (rather too bright, as it is cloudy outside) as it is by the words I put on the page. Distractions, so many distractions - line breaks and alignments and changing font colors .



How is a notebook different?

It's just you, and the pen, and the paper.

The world disappears. There are lines before you - or maybe none, as you so choose; but certainly, it will not change from one page to the next - and there are margins, and there are colors to these things, and the metal coils of the spiral binding or the pull of string from the sewn backing, but those things become no more than background noise, just part of the ambience of the book itself.

I have been writing, lately, on stone paper. It used to be a rare thing in the US - more common, apparently, in parts of South Asia - but has recently gained some popularity, notably being sold in Walgreens and Target. It is paper made, yes, of stone pulp-free. It is heavier than regular paper, tear proof and waterproof. Yes, really - write on it, run it under the water; not only will the ink remain, but you can still use the paper again once it has dried. (It is also, according to a physicist friend, unable to be dissolved when left overnight in vinegar, despite a purported limestone component.)

Message from Chief Medical Officer - Lt. Emily Graves

The weight and feel of paper can vary how I write - the length of sentences, the size of the script. The better it feels, the smoother the words, too, seem to become. Stone paper is good for this.

People speak of the benefits of Moleskins, but I've never been a big fan - they're almost too crisp and polished, really. There's no character to the paper, or the binding, or, then, the words that fill it. Paper should change, with use: grow softer, or crinkle, or whisper more insistently as you turn the pages. You have created more than words; you have changed the very composition of the chalice.

Try it sometime. Go out and really examine what's available - even just in an office supply store. Do you like recycled paper, perhaps? It's softer. Composition books versus subject

notebooks? Perhaps loose-leaf, and a binder? Sugarcane paper? College ruled? (Anything but college ruled is a travesty. Never forget it.)

Just write something. By hand. Sit down, and let the words flow. See what comes of them.

It is an urge as old as, perhaps, humanity itself: to preserve oneself in perpetuity, by telling one's story. Stenciling a hand on a cave wall, wedge-shapes marked in clay, marginalia, journals: it is all the same. And it holds something a computer screen cannot: the sweat of effort, the mark of one's own fingers on the product itself.



In a world that hurtles ever forward, technological leaps and bounds so swift it is all but impossible, at times, to keep pace - there are some urges that do not change.

And some, I think, we should embrace.


