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
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

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

Although it never flew in space (it was constructed without engines or a functional heat shield), NASA used it to perform test flights in the atmosphere, aided by a modified Boeing 747. The space shuttle was originally to be named Constitution, but President Ford was urged to change the name. Star Trek enthusiasts wrote thousands of letters to the White House asking it to be named after the Starship Enterprise, and it was! Cast members of the show attended the dedi-

Space Shuttle Enterprise is now on display at New York's Intrepid Sea, Air & Space Museum in the Space Shuttle Pavilion





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
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

Practical Engineering for a Shade Tent

Rise my minions!

I mean tent.

Remember those play parachutes we had in school as a kid? With a few alterations, they make terrific shade tents. And mine has proved to be tough and "mostly" waterproof.



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
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The first conundrum is that a play parachute is a flat circle but a round tent is a cone. I found that I had to remove three panels, and sew the edges back together with the flat-felled seams used on the rest of the tent to get a nice shape. Using Circumference = $2\pi r$, r= was calculated from the actual circumference of the circle made by the new bottom edge. I could measure the hypotenuse from V to B with a tape, and thus calculate the required height of the center pole above the outer edges .

Since play parachutes have to let the air out of the middle so they descend in a timely fashion, the center had a +/-7 inch hole in it already covered with a mesh and reinforced with the same black nylon ribbed strapping that also runs all the way around the outside and forms the handles. This was perfect. I made a thick wooden disk the same size as the hole from 3 round pieces of 3/4 plywood glued together. Found the center (more geometry) and drilled a 3/8" inch hole in the middle. After that, I dropped my disk in the hole, put a washer on a lot of wood screws and went all the way around at perhaps 1" intervals through the nylon attaching the ribbing to the disk. It has held over 10 years even in a thunderstorm with no sign of failure.

Since I had earlier figured out the variable h, I knew how much taller the middle pole needed to be than the outside poles. The combined length of pole would not fit in my car so it had to be made in two pieces or hinged. I drilled a hole in the end of my top piece of pole and screwed in a 3/8 inch lag bolt until I had about 3 inches sticking out and cut off the end to make a pin that would go in the center wood disc.

Then I got a really heavy duty hinge the width of the 2x4 I am using as the center pole and screwed it on so that there was no gap between the pole sections and one rested on the other. To keep it from folding in any breeze, I attached a u-shaped piece of metal pretty much like this one half onto the side of the joint opposite the hinge. This helped support the pole and kept it from swinging farther than





even. To keep it in "open" position, I drilled a couple holes at a slight downward angle through the ends of the U NOT permanently attached to

the bottom pole into the pole and stuck large nails into them through the metal into the holes. The angled nails are useful for hanging things like shields or lanterns.

As flimsy as this looks, it has worked for many years in high wind and rain situations.

As for the outside poles, I got about 10 2x2x8s and screwed big eye bolts into the end of each. My ropes (with adjustable sliders) have dog leash style clips on the ends so I just put the tent on the ground, drive in stakes about 2 feet farther out -enough to hold it temporarily. Then I get 4 more people and clip the poles to the ropes and the handles of the play parachute and the ropes are hooked to the stakes. When the center pole is put in, the four people hold on for dear life while the 5th person runs around tightening ropes and driving in stakes as fast as they can exactly in line with the center pole and the outer pole. In a reasonable wind, after 4-5 stakes and poles are in well and tightened up, the rest of the poles/stakes can follow at a slower pace. I put pieces of neon green pool noodle on the stakes to keep people from cutting themselves on the sharp steel tops or tripping on the ropes.

After using once, I cut a foot off all the pole bottoms so I could reach the edge of the tent.

NEW HORIZONS' ENCOUNTER WITH PLUTO: New Horizons made its closest approach to Pluto-Charon on July 14th, 2015. Because of the extreme distance, it will take more than a year to download all the data collected. However, we now know that Pluto and Charon are far more complex and interesting than any scientist would have predicted. I heard one scientist say, "if an artist drew a landscape as varied and

dynamic as we found, I'd have balked."

We take for granted that there is only one human species: Homo Sapiens. However, this is an illusion based on our short lifetimes. Merely a few tens of thousands of years ago, there were other species of humans, including Neandertals in Europe and the Denisovians in Asia. Why are they gone now? What happened that left us alone on the top of the world's food chain? Curtis Marean devotes his research career to finding out what made us so different.



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Dr. Marean leads an archeological dig called Pinnacle Point on the southern coast of South Africa. There, they found some of the earliest evidence that some human clans became "territorial", meaning, they gave up the nomadic hunting-gathering lifestye and stayed in one place for generations. The interior African food supply was always on the move, and thus, so were early humans. However, the population of Pinnacle Point recognized that shellfish could be harvested to meet the bulk of their dietary needs, whilst living in relatively protected caves. These coastal resources were highly predictable, only requiring a minimum effort to harvest.

There was, however, one disadvantage. Other groups learned of the resource and given our genetically determined competitive nature, fought for it. The tribes that were able to cooperate best, in this case, to wage war, won out, and their genes were passed on generation to generation. Marean and others call this strong ingrained trait of cooperation "hypersociality" and believe it to be different from that shown by lower species.

There was one other factor that gave Homo Sapiens an advantage over Neandertals and Denisovians: advanced projectile weapons. It began with a wooden stabbing stick, but progressed to stone tipped casting spears, then leverage-assisted casting spears called "atlatl", and finally the bow and arrow. ICBM's (intercontinental ballistic missiles) were a bit later. These projectile weapons that could kill from a distance required a number of technologies. First and foremost, the ability to carve sharp and very small stone points ("micro lithic" tech), which increased trauma, bringing the animal or rival down faster. Both Neandertals and H. Sapiens carved stone blades, but only humans were able to miniaturize the points to make them viable to throw as spear/arrow points.

Marean and others believe that when Homo Sapiens started leaving Africa about 70,000-55,000 years ago, their genetic tendency to cooperate with unrelated individuals, plus their ability to kill from a distance, gave them all the advantage they needed to dominate our other ancestors, the Neandertals and Denisovians. It's likely that our ancestors wiped out their rivals and mated with their women, which explains the 1-4% of Neanderthal genes we have in us today.

This paints a pretty bleak picture of human behavioral tendencies, and of course, we see it playing out in the news every day, with ongoing wars and armed conflicts across the globe. But that same tendency to cooperate in war also works for peaceful, altruistic endeavors. Neighbors helping one another through natural disasters, volunteerism, peaceful protest against injustice/inequity. And near and dear to my heart, cooperation with the goal of exploring the universe. We need no more proof than the International Space Station. Professor Marean makes the case, and I strongly concur, that we can and often do manage to overcome our competitive/ruthless natures by educating our younger generations, not just academically, but socially and ethically. We must capitalize on the pro-social aspects of cooperation for the greater good of all humanity, and protect this fragile space station we call Earth, even as we reach for the stars.

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Message from Chief Medical Officer - Lt. Commander Ann Case





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Message from Ship's Counselor - VACANT

When you look at most people's list of bad habits they want to break, procrastination is typically one of them. Procrastination is hardly a new trend; it's been around for centuries. According to Dr. Timothy Pychyl, a master of procrastination (I mean, a master scholar of procrastination), the earliest documented reference of procrastination is in a sermon written in 1682.

What makes procrastination so robust? What makes it so hard to wipe out even though we know how much it affects not only our productivity but our peace of mind? If you struggle with procrastination and wonder why you haven't been able to break the habit, consider these three things that keep procrastination flowing in our bloodstream.

1. Things Get Done

Procrastination means not starting to do the work until you are dangerously close to the deadline. And then, pushed against the deadline, you start working at a frenetic pace. You focus your attention entirely on your almost-late project and ignore everything else. Your body can go for hours without sleep or food-copious amounts of coffee will do just fine. Eventually, your last-minute frantic action pays off:

The work gets done! This way of getting things done gives you a false sense of confidence. It makes you believe that you can get any job done, regardless of how late you start. The thrill of achieving something that seemed so impossible-like creating an entire presentation for an important meeting in just one night—gives you an unforgettable high. You feel proud, relieved (and probably exhausted). But you did it! And maybe you can do it again ... and when you think you are able to get anything done, regardless of how late you start, you have no motivation-no reason—to stop procrastinating

2. Life Goals Have No Deadlines

Procrastination means waiting till the last minute to get things done. But that only works when you know when the "last minute" is. Without a clearly defined and well-established deadline, you risk never getting the task done. Of course, not everything we have to or want to do come with deadlines.

Consider life goals. Life goals have no deadlines. Early in our lives, there are some rough deadlines. People expect us to start crawling by 10 months, and start talking by about 24 months. We're supposed to start primary school at about age 6 and finish high school by around 18. And at least some of us have to come to terms with the fact that our parents won't be supporting us financially forever, so we know that at that point, we need to get a job.

3. You Think Procrastination Is a Problem

We tend to think of procrastination as a problem—as a bad habit or an irreversible personality trait that will constantly drain our potential and get in the way of our achievements. But procrastination may not a problem at all. It may actually be a solution—a solution that your brain generates in response to the need to take action.

Procrastination is the tendency to delay taking action. It is the disconnect between intention and implementation. To translate a plan into action, your brain analyzes a vast amount of information from your internal and external environment, and makes decisions about what to do next. When you have all the information you need, you start working on a plan. If you don't, your brain stalls. And that's when you experience procrastination.

This could be a critical shift in your thinking: Instead of considering procrastination as a big problem, a habit you need to break, or a hardwired part of your personality, think of it as an alarm, or a red flag-a sign that something is missing. Something is preventing you from getting started and getting things done.

Your job is to discover what that is. When you discover it, the odds will be in your favor.

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
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Natasha "Tasha" Yar is a fictional character that mainly appeared in the first season of the American science fiction television series Star Trek: The Next Generation. Portrayed by Denise Crosby, she is chief of security aboard the Starfleet starship USS Enterprise-D and carries the rank of lieutenant. The character's concept was originally based upon the character of Vasquez from the 1986 film Aliens. Following further development she became known first as Tanya, and then Tasha. Crosby had originally auditioned for the role of Deanna Troi, while Rosalind Chao became a favorite for Tasha. After Marina Sirtis auditioned for the role, the show's creator Gene Roddenberry decided to switch the roles for the actresses, with Sirtis becoming Troi and Crosby becoming Yar (Chao would later appear on the series in a recurring role as Keiko O'Brien).

The character first appeared in the series' pilot episode, "Encounter at Farpoint". After Crosby decided to leave the show, Yar was killed by the creature Armus in "Skin of Evil", the 23rd episode of the season. She was written back into the show for a guest appearance in the third season episode "Yesterday's Enterprise", in which the timeline was altered so that she did not die, and again in the final episode of the series "All Good Things...", in events set prior to the pilot.

She was described as a forerunner to other strong women in science fiction, such as Kara Thrace from the 2004 version of Battlestar Galactica, while providing a step between the appearances of female characters in *The Original Series* to the command positions they have in *Star Trek: Deep* Space Nine and Voyager. Questions were raised over the sexuality of the character, and it was thought that the events in the episode "The Naked Now" were designed to establish her heterosexuality. The manner of her first death was received with mostly negative reviews. One critic called it typical of the death of a Star Trek security officer, and the scene was also included in a list of "naff" sci-fi deaths.
