Remember the Vulcan salute from the original "Star Trek" series? The holodeck from "Star Trek: The Next 05-934720 Generation?" Captain Janeway from "Star Trek: Voyager?" The 06-758106 Starfleet officers at the center of CBS All Access' "Star Trek: Lower Decks" do. Ditto the writers who shape the main characters, four young ensigns usually assigned mundane tasks far from the prestigious bridge, in the legendary sci-fi franchise's second animated series and first comedy (streaming 07-846821 weekly starting today).

"Secretly, every character on 'Lower Decks' is a Trekkie," creator Mike McMahan ("Rick and Morty," "Solar Opposites") says. "They're all fans of 'Star Trek,' which is why they're so excited to be there" in post-"Star Trek: Nemesis" 2380, a time frame after all the "Trek" series except "Star Trek: Picard." "And the group of comedy writers who also happen to be 'Star Trek' fans is pretty broad." McMahan's favorite "Trek" series - and a big influence on the 10-episode "Lower Decks" is "Next Generation." He's a fan of android Data, engineer Geordi La Forge and their relationship. "A lot of Data and Geordi lived in the (secondary) stories of 'TNG,' which is why I think of 'Lower Decks' as a big (secondary) story" with the accompanying heavy emphasis on character and personality, he says.

"Lower Decks," already renewed for Season 2, follows the USS Cerritos, a starship that makes unsexy "second contact" with alien species, and its ensign quartet: talented but rebellious Beckett Mariner (voiced by Tawny Newsome); ambitious but insecure Brad Boimler (Jack Quaid); figuratively and literally green Orion Tendi (Noël Wells); and Rutherford (Eugene Cordero), an engineer whose cyborg implant has a mind of its own.

"Someone described (Mariner and Boimler) as the odd couple of Starfleet. There's very much a push and pull of rigidity vs. breaking rules," says Newsome ("Space Force"), who grew up watching "Star Trek: Deep Space Nine" and "Voyager" with her parents. Mariner, who values Starfleet's peaceful, exploratory spirit but bridles at its bureaucracy, displays "toughness, married with a little bit of swagger and out-and-out bravado," she says. "That lends itself really well to comedy." Ah, comedy, a final format frontier for the venerable brand. "There's so many references to existing Starfleet things. ... worlds, characters, species, items, terminology, that's all fair game for us as long as it makes sense," says McMahan, who promises guest appearances by previous "Trek" cast members. "Instead of just having some random alien, let's use an alien that has a whole backstory, a species you understand."

Tendi is a very different Orion, "not controlling men with pheromones and doing belly dances," as Orion slave girls did in earlier "Trek" productions, McMahan says. And the ship's chief medical officer, Dr. T'Ana, is a feline Caitian, "not purring and sexual," like M'Ress in the first animated series, but "more like Bones," the gruff Dr. Leonard McCoy.

McMahan isn't worried that viewers will see "Lower Decks" as parody. The people behind the show are true fans, and "Trek" has often embraced humor, from Tribbles to "Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home," which is "flat out a comedy," he says.

While pushing the franchise into new areas, "Lower Decks" is respectful of "Trek" canon. McMahan dropped the idea of having T'Pol from "Star Trek: Enterprise" appear, because "Vulcans just don't live long enough. The timing didn't work out."


McMahan and Newsome say the diverse voice cast and characters reflect long-standing "Trek" philosophy.

" 'Star Trek' has always been known as this thing that is the aspirational future of humanity," McMahan says. With a broader casting net, "you get a more vibrant, interesting group of people that don't all sound the same, which reflects humanity in general."

With the show, which features a Black female captain, "diversity is just expected and is never really commented upon, which is a signal of true 24thcentury values," Newsome says.

Past "Trek" shows haven't entirely lived up to that principle, she says, noting strong female characters in the '90s series who nevertheless were shown "gossiping about boys." And those shows were improvements on the depictions of women in the '60s series.

Starfleet captains haven't always managed to keep pandemics from doing massive damage - from the plague that wiped out the adult population of an entire planet in The Original Series' "Miri" to the Phage in Star Trek: Voyager.

But the Federation may be able to claim at least some part of a disease-fighting victory here in sector OO1. More specifically, my home: the Canadian province of British Columbia.

While COVID-19 is still surging in many places, B.C.'s curve-flattening success has been hailed around the world, earning kudos from news outlets including CNN and the New York Times.

Much of the credit goes to the province's dedicated, experienced public health officials and courageous frontline workers. But officials and workers in other jurisdictions are just as skilled, brave, and dedicated. Their advice, though, often went unheeded until the virus had already tightened its grip in those communities.

The difference may lie in the fact that the leader of BC's government, Premier John Horgan, is also arguably the province's most prominent Star Trek fan.

The Trekkie in the command chair -

Horgan was hooked on the show from an early age. "The Pollyanna view that we can all work together to a better outcome all faiths, all ethnicities - that appealed to me," he told a columnist after taking the reins of BC's left-wing New Democratic Party (NDP).

He's known for leaning out of his office window and playfully heckling fellow politicians, telling one who walked by one day in a red outfit that she was lucky this wasn't an away mission. One wall of his office bears a framed picture of Kirk, Picard, Janeway, Sisko, and Archer along with a plaque reading "Engage: Stardate 2017.07.18" - the date his government was sworn in. And while he has a deep-seated affection for all things Trek, his favorite captain is Janeway.

In short, the government of British Columbia is led by someone who spent his formative years - and his adult life immersed in Federation space. And it turns out that's pretty good preparation for navigating an unprecedented crisis.

Exploring strange new worlds... before you have to live in them -



Today hand-washing, mask-wearing and physical distancing are the norm (or at least, the norm we're trying to reach). But back in February and March, when governments were making those all-important decisions on their first response to the virus, even respectable media voices were saying "It'll be like a bad flu year." Denial was still the order of the day.

Just recognizing the scope of an unprecedented danger can require enormous leaps of imagination. That's especially true when it's an invisible threat, and one plenty of voices are calling overblown.

It demands the ability to imagine what the world will be like without drastic changes and the massive devastation that could result. And you have to be equally able to imagine a world where you've taken steps that would otherwise be politically unthinkable.

As we've learned in the past few months, that skill's in shorter supply than we might have hoped. Too many political leaders lacked the imagination to act until the crisis was on their doorstep.

But if you're a Star Trek fan with a few series under your belt, you're already well trained in exploring strange new worlds. ("Weird is part of the job," as Janeway once told Harry Kim.) You've seen widespread catastrophe: Deneva ravaged by neural parasites Vulcan crushed by a singularity, and Mars with its surface scorched and its atmosphere still burning.

You've even already experienced countless epidemics, including an inhibition-removing contaminant that struck Enterprise crews twice .

So imagining how bad a pandemic could get if left unchecked? Not a big leap.

And for the same reason, you've had a series of master classes in unorthodox solutions: not mere 'Trek-no babble (governments don't have a forward sensor array they can reroute graviton particles through) but creative innovations, interventions, and shifts in perspective, such assessing a creature not as a deadly threat to be killed but as a mother trying to protect her young.

Then there's the solution Janeway chose when Voyager encountered a huge Mutara-class nebula riddled with deadly sub nucleonic radiation. She ordered the entire crew into stasis except for the two who were unaffected by the radiation - Seven of Nine and the Doctor — who then crewed the ship on its month-long journey through the nebula.

Watch that episode, and suddenly the idea of an extended economic shutdown where everyone except essential workers stays home doesn't seem so far-fetched. Neither does the need to provide additional moral and financial support for those workers as the shutdown wears on.

And neither does providing economic support or a freeze on evictions to ensure we can all still keep food on the table and a roof over our heads - especially if, like Horgan, you're a social democrat whose worldview aligns with Gene Roddenberry's egalitarian, post-exploitation vision of the future.

"Set a course... for home."

With the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, Janeway being Horgan's favorite captain takes on a new dimension. Before the outbreak, he attributed that in part to being raised by his mother with the help of his older sister. But you can read a lot of 2020's zeitgeist into the story of a ship on a lengthy journey through unknown, often dangerous space.

Like Voyager's crew, we don't know how long an odyssey we have in front of us, and we're often improvising on the fly as we learn, adapt and encounter unexpected shortages. (Maybe we're hoping for coffee in that nebula; maybe it's more like toilet paper and PPE.) Like them, we're hitting roadblocks and setbacks; the past few weeks, for instance, have seen BC's case numbers tick back upward.

And you could forgive Premier Horgan if he was to see something of his own role in a captain trying to get her sometimes-fractious crew safely home. British Columbia's politics may not be quite as polarized as Federation-Maguis differences, but we do have our moments.

The future right now feels less certain than it has in a long time - and not just because of COVID-19. All we really know is that it won't be the last of the huge, unexpected challenges we face, whether they come in the form of another pandemic, climate-related disruption or some other threat. And that we'll need imagination from our leaders and each other - both to recognize those challenges and to embrace the changes they require.

That also means changing what we think of as qualifications for elected office. I'm not saying that policies, platforms and promises are less important than an insightful take on Darmok. But a capacity for imagination is crucial.

"In these unprecedented times" is just another way of saying we're going where no-one has gone before. And we need to know that our leaders are ready for that journey.

It's really difficult to write a report for our ship when we're still in "lock down". We're not doing much together, so what to write about ...?



I hope everyone is doing well in these trying times. Soon, we will have a third season of "Star Trek: Discovery" to distract us from the stresses we are facing in everyday life. While you wait for ST:D, I highly recommend that you check out "Star Trek: Lower Decks" for your Trek-based entertainment. It has quickly become one of my favorite spin-off series in the Star Trek Universe.

"Star Trek: Lower Decks" is the second animated Star Trek series to date. Unlike "Star Trek: The Animated Series" from the 70's, which was a designed-to-be-taken-seriously continuation of "Star Trek: The Original Series", ST:LD is a slickly-produced, irreverent romp through the extended Star

Trek Universe as experienced by some lovable Starfleet D-listers: crew members that you know must exist in the Star Trek Universe, but you rarely got to see them on screen (exceptions being Edward Larkin of the USS Cabot, and, to a lesser extent, Reginald Barclay of the USS Enterprise D). ST:LD's animation style, pacing, and warped (core) humor is heavily influenced by the shows "Rick and Morty" and "Solar Opposites" and, as such, is designed for a more "mature" (but not too mature) audience than the other Star Trek series (except, perhaps for Discovery).

With influences like "Rick and Morty", it may sound like Lower Decks would be a crass corruption of what most people expect from Star Trek, yet ST:LD still contains much of what made the rest of the Star Trek Universe enjoyable: interesting and likable characters, friendship, exploration, and a generally positive outlook on life, people and the future. Plus, without going into spoiler territory, the characters and situations they get involved in are rather hilarious. I never thought there would be a doctor more crotchety than McCoy and the EMH, but in ST:LD, there's this cat...

Check out "Star Trek: Lower Decks", and stick with it beyond the pilot (an admittedly weak start to the series). Each subsequent episode is funnier, and more Trek-like, than the one before. I eagerly await the season finale (which was not released during the time frame this article covers) and hope that there will be more seasons in the future.

While appearing as a delicate and light veil draped across the sky, this image from the NASA/ESA Hubble Space Telescope actually depicts a small section of the Cygnus supernova blast wave, located around 2,400 lightyears away. The name of the supernova remnant comes from its position in the northern constellation of Cygnus (the Swan), where it covers an area 36 times larger than the full Moon.



The original supernova explosion blasted apart a dying star about 20 times more massive than our Sun between 10.000 and 20,000 years ago. Since then, the remnant has expanded 60 light-years from its center. The shockwave marks the outer edge of the supernova remnant and continues to expand at around 220 miles per second. The interaction of the ejected material and the low-density interstellar material swept up by the shockwave forms the distinctive veil-like structure seen in this image.






